In August the first case of the West Nile Virus was detected in Shasta County. KRCR spoke with the man whose life was flipped upside down from this mosquito bite.



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
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
"He woke up and said, 'I just don't feel good,'" explained Joe's wife, Jonae Raffa. As he continued to feel worse, they never believed what it would escalate to. "At one point, he told me he felt like his muscles were being eaten." Jonae continued, "He said I feel like my body is eating my muscles. When he woke up Thursday morning, he, literally, was paralyzed from the waist down."



"He woke up and said," I just don't feel good," said Joe's wife, Jonae Raffa. As he continued to feel worse they never believed what it would escalate to. "At one point he told me he felt like his muscles were being eaten."

66 I'm in a wheelchair, here, you know," said Joe, "I never expected this and it's... it's very emotional. I can tell you that much.

Joe has now been recovering and doing all he can to get back where he once was. "It's an incomplete paralysis, which means I am curable," said Joe. "I can get over this. I am going to be able to walk. You got to stay strong and you got to pick your head up can't let it go down."



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Joe is not the only one. According to the CDC, about one in five people who are infected develop a fever and other symptoms. About 1 out of 150 infected people develop a serious, sometimes fatal, illness.



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
66 "Don't take it as a joke," said Joe. "Start using bug spray. I mean, I never thought a mosquito would take me down but, unfortunately, it did."

After everything, Joe will get to go home by the end of October and his resilience inspires many and is surrounded by support from his friends, family and wife. "My friends are bound and determined to get me walking." Joe continued. "They told me they will tie their legs to my legs and we will walk around together."
